at our shows. It's like having their big brother or sister on stage, says Hannah Goalstone, vice president of the AOK Cabaret board.

Helper network

Feldman founded AOK Cabaret in 2001, inspired by an account of a woman who organized a volunteer network of knitters to make blankets for children in hospitals around the world. "I'd been looking for

ways to do something like that," she said. I was a cabaret singer but no one knew who I was. But once I turned it into being about the organizations I wanted to help and not about me, this organization sort of formed itself."

Feldman named the group after "the idea of a kindness chain, that if you do something good, someone else will feel good and do something good."

Cabaret shows, that make

singers who perform shows to raise money for non-profit organizations serving those in need. Last year, the group raised \$30,000 and this year promises to be even more successful, said Hilary Ann Feldman, AOK founder, director and performer.

"A Little Help From My Friends," AOK show on March 3, will raise funds for Highland Park's Music Arts School, where Feldman studied piano in the early 1980s and now serves on the voice faculty.

Feldman learned about philanthropy, as well as how to play the piano, from the school's founder Mortimer Scheff, an acclaimed pianist. "He really believed that everyone had a musical gift and that everyone deserved a good musical education, no matter what their talent level," she said.

Musical variety

"A Little Help From My Friends" highlights themes of
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strong, personal connection between audience and performer, are an ideal way to implement kindnesses, Feldman believes.

"It's an intensely personal evening of songs and stories delivered by singers in a simple, honest way," she said. "At the end of a cabaret show, you should feel like you've just had coffee with the singers and have gotten to know them a bit."
